An Interview With Phil Earle

Q1. What are your earliest memories of books and reading? For example, did you have a favourite or inspirational book?

I wasn't really a reader as a child to be honest. I didn't have the confidence or the concentration span to settle with a book. I did love being told stories though. There was something magnificent about being sat on my dad's knee as he spun me a yarn.

Q2. What inspired you to become an author / illustrator?

At the age of 26 I got a job in a bookshop. Not because I was a reader, just to pay the bills. They made me work in the kids department and shoved a copy of Louis Sachar's HOLES in my hands.

That book is perfect. And it definitely changed my life.

Q3. For you, what makes a successful book or illustration?

Heart. As simple as that. There's nothing as redundant as a book that has nothing of the writer in it.

Q4. Do you have a specific audience in mind when you write your books / plan your illustrations?

Just me! I always sit down to write the book I would like to read myself.

Q5. What future do you think the physical book has? For example, do you think the electronic book will replace the physical book?

There's no doubt the physical book has a future. Books are furniture.

The way we collect music has evolved because we've always needed a device on which to listen to it. But the book is an entity in itself.

Q6. Are you a book collector? Is there a special book you'd love to own?

I'm not sure I'd class myself as a collector, but I do love my books.

My prized possession is a signed first edition of THE BOOK THIEF, which I was lucky enough to work on during my time at Random House.

I'd love to own a first edition of SE Hinton's THE OUTSIDERS. Or HOLES.
