An Interview With Rachel Finch

Q1. What are your earliest memories of books and reading? For example, did you have a favourite or inspirational book?

I have always loved to read. I enjoyed books of a mystical nature in my early years, stories that were otherworldly. I was heavily into Virginia Andrews in my early teens and a particularly powerful book for me was 'Flowers in the Attic'. Jane Austen was another favourite. I read a whole array of genres but it was my love for poetry that developed in my late teens and that has stayed the most important literature to me.

Q2. What inspired you to become an author?

The trauma I have experienced was really the inspiration behind my writing. I was looking for a way to deal with the heavy feelings I was having and poetry became a very therapeutic form of self- expression. I wanted to write to inspire other survivors to share their stories.

Q3. For you, what makes a successful book?

I consider a book to be successful if it was written with drive and truth and if it is read with a shared awareness. I have a deep love for poetry and I don't believe there is any one way to succeed with prose.

Q4. Do you have a specific audience in mind when you write your books?

I do have a specific audience. I started a blog with my writing and have built a huge following of others that have survived abuse/trauma. I write for anyone that feels they cannot find their worth. I write so that women that have been sexually violated can remember their courage and their purity. I write for those that struggle with depression/mental illness and I hope to inspire them to keep fighting for their lives.

Q5. What future do you think the physical book has? For example, do you think the electronic book will replace the physical book?

I have noticed through my experience of publishing that books are far more readily available online than in any store. I have also seen the number of bookstores in my country decline over time. I can see electronic books playing a massive part in the future of literature, but I do still very much hope we continue to be able to flip the pages ourselves and connect with the words in our palms.

Q6. Are you a book collector? Is there a special book you'd love to own?

I have always loved to collect books. I have books from a whole variety of genres but it is the poetry collection I am building that excites me. I would love to own Nicole Lyons 'I Am A World Of Uncertainties Disguised As A Girl'.
