Author and Illustrator E-Interviews

Thank you for agreeing to take part in this series of Letterpress Project e-interviews that we are undertaking over the coming months. Q1. What are your earliest memories of books and reading? For example, did you have a favourite or inspirational book?

We only had 6 books at home (3 adult books, a recipe book, a gardening book and a dictionary, which I read, but character development wasn't very gripping), so I was very lucky to be invited for "morning coffee" by an elderly lady I soon knew as my lovely Aunt Vick. It turned out to be cake and orange juice – and she had a piano and a full bookcase! I was allowed to read Five On A Treasure Island – and was hooked on books for life. My lovely parents took me to our lovely library so often that I'd finished the children's section aged 9 so was allowed into the adults' to read Agatha Christie, Sherlock Holmes and PG Wodehouse.

Q2. What inspired you to become an author / illustrator?

I wanted to inspire children to become hooked on books and derive the pleasure from them that so many authors have given to me.

Q3. For you, what makes a successful book or illustration?

Book: gripping, thrilling or humorous, with characters to love and hate, mysteries and puzzles to solve. Illustration: tells me more about the characters or plot.

Q4. Do you have a specific audience in mind when you write your books / plan your illustrations?

Myself as a child; and my daughters.

Q5. What future do you think the physical book has? For example, do you think the electronic book will replace the physical book?

I think they will happily co-exist.

Q6. Are you a book collector? Is there a special book you'd love to own?

No I'm not. But a signed first edition of Cold Comfort Farm or Right Ho, Jeeves would be wonderful.
